Course Title:	Master of Fine Arts (MfA) Professional Acting
Duration of Course :	One year (full time)
Entry Requirements:	Please note: this course is only open to those who are NOT ordinarily resident in the EU/UK. This course is ONLY open for international applications.
	Applicants would normally be expected to have an undergraduate degree in a related subject area such as Drama, Acting, Theatre Studies or Performance Studies. However, applicants with extensive relevant professional experience will also be considered.
	For speakers of English as a second language an IELTS 7.0 (International English Language Testing System) is the minimum requirement with a minimum of 7.0 in each component of reading, listening and speaking and 6.5 in writing.
	Applicants will be auditioned by two practitioners, one of whom will either be a senior member of Bristol Old Vic Theatre School Acting staff or a practitioner of high standing in the industry. Auditions will be video recorded for final selection by senior members of the Bristol Old Vic Theatre School Acting staff.
	At audition, applicants will need to demonstrate a good standard of acting, both in terms of preparation and ability to take direction.  Applicants will be given an opportunity to ask questions about the Course as part of the audition session, as well as via internet or phone contact.
Course Outline:	This one-year Masters level course gives up to 14 International postgraduate students from outside the EU the opportunity to study in Bristol on an intensive one-year Conservatoire acting course. There is a strong emphasis on developing the actor's voice and body and a commitment to building performance through close text work.
	As well as working on the core actor skills, there is a focus on the classical British and European repertoire, a practical exploration of Shakespearean text as well as contemporary work.
	In the spring or summer term students are directed in a production, supported by professional design, stage management and costume students or practitioners. The specific nature of this production may be altered should COVID-19 conditions make public performance impossible.
	The main thrust of the course is to equip students with a range of techniques appropriate to the varied acting demands made within the current performance industry, including those appropriate to the recorded media. The training will provide graduates with the skills to work at a high professional standard in the country where they choose to practice.
